1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The College, a UGC registered college (under 2(f) & 12B), believes in the idea that education does not consist in mere learning, but involves fostering a sense of social responsibility among its students, the future pioneers of social change. It is with these aims that the college has been moving ahead, contributing to the cause of education and hopes to do so in the years to come.

This College is a Govt. of West Bengal Aided degree college affiliated to the West Bengal State University and upgraded from Bachelor's to Master's degree in the list of colleges included u/s 2(f) and 12(b) of the UGC Act, 1956 vide UGC letter No. 8-104/2019(CPP-I/C) dated 17/12/2019. Currently the college is governed with 18 Under Graduate departments and three Post Graduate Departments. The institute is offering 4 years UG Programmes B. A. (Major/Honours) in Bengali, Economics, English, History, Philosophy, Political Science, Sanskrit; 3 years UG Multidisciplinary B. A. (Minor/General) in Journalism & Mass Communication, Education; 4 years UG Programmes B. Sc. (Major/Hons) in Botany, Chemistry, Economics, Industrial Fish & Fisheries, Mathematics, Physics, Zoology, 3 years UG Multidisciplinary B.Sc. (Minor/General) in Computer Science, Statistics & Molecular Biology. The college offers two years Post Graduate Courses MSc in Botany, Mathematics & Physics.

For the holistic development of the youth of today, apart from building of their body and the mind amongst the eco-friendly sprawling green campus of the college over-viewing the Bon-Hooghly Lake, we also encourage conservation of biodiversity through its sustainable development to save our Mother Nature. As our objective is advancement of learning accompanied by modern teaching aids, the campus is now Wi Fi enabled with digital classrooms. The library resources are enormous with a huge collection of books and journals. We provide the well-furnished hostel facility for the girl students residing at far-off places. It is noteworthy to say that College has a huge list of alumni well placed in various esteemed institutions throughout India as academicians, theatre personalities and top level administrators. It has a record set of excellent teachers well known for their scholarly activities and researches of international stature.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- 1. Extremely dedicated, motivated and highly qualified teachers striving to maintain the standard of the institution.
- 2. The eco-friendly sprawling green campus of the college over-viewing the Bon-Hooghly lake is our greatest advantage for which our students can promote conservation of nature and its sustainable utilization of resources to the neighbouring community.
- 3. The campus is WiFi enabled and is completely under e-governance.
- 4. The college has been upgraded from Undergraduate to Post Graduate institution starting from the 2017-18 session.
- 5. On-line admission process started in the 2015-2016 session, running successfully throughout ensuring complete transparency.
- 6. Students' semester admission data and result maintenance software has been running smoothly since 2013-14.
- 7. Gradual progression of Accounting and computation from Tally ERP 9 to Tally Prime enables accurate auditing of accounts since 2014.
- 8. Following WB Govt. norms, Staff Salary, Provident fund and ROPA 19 pay fixation work is being done through e-pradan and HRMS module of WBIFMS portal.
- 9. Library automation through KOHA has been completed and access through OPAC is now available. Eresources availability has been ensured by subscribing to INFLIBNET. The library has a subscription of 26 journals and 18,755 books including rare collections.
- 10. The Career Counseling and Placement Cell has been actively taking care of students' job prospects in various subjects through seminars that are being held frequently by external agencies.
- 11. The College has been providing scholarships to economically backward students as a part of Students Aid-Fund. The Equal Opportunity Cell has been active in spreading awareness for availing various

- scholarships. The meritorious students are encouraged to avail SVMCM scholarships.
- 12. Several interdisciplinary Add on/Certificate courses as well as skill enhancement courses are being included beyond the prescribed curriculum which are interdisciplinary and meant to enrich the skill set of the students.
- 13. Value education and Health awareness programs for students including seminars, workshops and various community outreach activities through NSS are being done regularly.
- 14. As a part of inclusive education Divyangan facilities are provided for the physically challenged students.
- 15. A huge playground encompasses our campus which are provided for games & sports activities of the students of the neighbouring community apart from those of our own.

Institutional Weakness

- 1. Lack of space for newer classrooms and other infrastructural facilities in laboratories .
- 2. Insufficient funds from the Government which are not dispersed uniformly over the entire financial year poses problems for the college in planning and execution of projected works.

Institutional Opportunity

- 1. IQAC for the last few years has sensitized the Departments regarding quality control, maintenance of students data record, academic expansion and utilization of funds.
- 2. Various research Laboratories like that funded from DBT- BOOST, DST-SERB have been set up successfully wherein regular research activity by the students and Faculty members can be performed.
- 3. As MoU with several institutions have already been signed, several capacity building initiatives as well as skill based programs can be organized through faculty exchange and student exchange, for maximum utilization of human resources.
- 4. Transition of all administrative activities from paper based to paperless digital mode is being done by grooming staff through various capacity building initiatives.

Institutional Challenge

1. The students who are enrolled here mainly belong to the economically weaker sections of the society as well as are first generation learners.

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- 2. Being a college in the northern suburbs of the city but affiliated to a rurally placed University, student enrolment is decreasing gradually.
- 3. Generating resources and creating reserve funds for maintaining day-to-day activities of the College and annual maintenance of sophisticated instruments in the laboratories.
- 4. Since the college building has completed 68 years and the cost of maintenance tends to be higher, paucity of funds poses a challenge.
- 5. Complete grooming of students through academic and value education programmes to motivate them to remain focussed in their vision of achieving their goals despite political, religious or socio-economic biases.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Criteria 1 provides details of curriculum planning pointing out the ways the College, as an affiliated College, is involved in. It also notes the several steps taken by the College to implement the syllabus using a well-planned and documented process that includes the academic calendar and a process of continuous internal assessment. Details of add on courses offered by the College, including data on numbers of students enrolled, etc is also provided here. This Criterion also provides details of activities organized by the College to work towards curriculum enhancement with reference to issues relating to gender, professional ethics and human values and environment and sustainability. Documents pertaining to the various courses and events organized have been uploaded as well. Information and data pertaining to field work, extension activities and internships are also included in this Criterion. The feedback system that the College uses in order to maintain academic standards is also provided in detail. A feedback analysis is provided as well.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching, Learning and evaluation manifests the perfection of the student's inner self. The teachers foster it through encouragement and motivation. The entire admission process is in online mode according to the guideline of West Bengal State University. The admission process is transparent and the college strictly adheres to the reservation policy of the Government of West Bengal.

- The college management gives utmost importance in filling up vacancies against sanctioned posts. During the assessment period the average percentage of full time teachers against sanctioned posts is 100% and most full time teachers have Ph.D as their highest qualification.
- To enhance the students' learning process various online platforms were used to cope with the difficulties during the pandemic. Since the students are heterogeneous with respect to their learning abilities and socio-cultural background, the college adopts various learning and evaluation strategies like interactive method, assignments, field-based projects, remedial classes, tutorial classes etc.
- All the faculty members are engaged in the mentoring activity.

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- Throughout the year the college organizes various activities according to the "Academic Calendar" prepared by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell.
- Choice Based Credit System for UG was followed since 2018-19 and for PG since 2019-20 academic session. Newsletter, Magazines are published and Poetry Reading Sessions are organized to nurture creativity, writing skills and presentation potentialities in the students.
- The Programme Outcomes (POs) and Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) are prepared in strict compliance with the norms and objectives of Outcome Based learning set by the learning objectives mentioned by the affiliating university.
- Keeping in mind the hierarchical model of outcome-based education, all the UG and PG departments have prepared the Course Outcomes (COs) of all the courses offered under the guidance of the Internal Quality Assurance Cell.
- As per the University norms the college conducts internal assessment on the basis of students' attendance, writing skills (project assignments), presentation skills (students' seminar) and knowledge levels (internal assessments).
- Grievances related to the end-semester examination results also get addressed by the Grievance Redressal Committee, who additionally help the students apply for revising the answer scripts and file RTI if required.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Research, Publication, and Patents:

- Faculty members regularly publish books and research articles in UGC-approved journals.
- Collaboration between faculty members and students for publications fosters a research-oriented environment.
- The patent for "Formulation of Organic Fish Food for the live-bearer ornamental fishes" showcases innovative thinking.
- DBT-Funded BOOST Program from the previous years has enabled the m of a central Instrumentation facility that benefits science departments at BKC College and other institutions.
- Access to advanced equipment enhances research capabilities.

Workshops and Seminars:

• Hosting a "National level Workshop on Data Analytics" in collaboration with SQC & OR division, ISI, Kolkata, demonstrates the college's commitment to cutting-edge knowledge dissemination.

• Seminars covering diverse fields (such as environmental biotechnology, biomathematical modeling, and machine learning) contribute to expanding knowledge horizons.

Faculty Enrichment Programs:

- Extension lectures on "ICT tools in teaching, learning, and evaluation" equip teachers with modern methodologies.
- Excel and Tally workshops enhance teachers' skills.

Certificate Courses:

• Offering certificate courses in areas like mushroom growing, LaTeX for scientific writing, media, and communication provides practical skills and fosters entrepreneurship among students.

Incubation Center and Innovative Activities:

- The active Incubation Center, established through the Institutional Innovation Council (IIC), supports innovative projects (e.g., mushroom cultivation and bioenzyme production).
- Such initiatives cultivate an entrepreneurial mindset among students.

MoUs, Linkages, and Collaborations:

- Collaborations with universities, academic institutes, and NGOs provide valuable opportunities for onthe-job training and internships.
- These partnerships enrich learning experiences for both students and faculty members.

Outreach Activities and Social Impact:

- BKC College's participation in the IIRS-ISRO Outreach program on "GIS and Remote Sensing" positions it as a nodal center for geospatial activities.
- The NSS unit's extension activities, awareness campaigns, and social welfare work contribute to social change and community empowerment.

Environmental Initiatives:

• The college's recognition as the "District Green Champion" for setting up the SAP (Swachhta Action Plan) Committee underscores its commitment to sustainability.

• Activities related to plantation, sanitization, hygiene, energy conservation, and water conservation contribute to a greener campus.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Brahmananda Keshab Chandra College covers a total area of approximately 6 acres comprising of a three-storied main building, an annex building, a Women's Hostel, a Staff quarters and a large, fenced, lush green playground.

The campus is under constant CCTV surveillance and is enabled with Wi-Fi connectivity. Attendance of all staffs are maintained through Biometric System.

There are 39 well-ventilated and Wi-Fi-enabled classrooms, of which 12 have ICT-facility and 2 are Smart-classrooms. There are a total of 66 computers of which 41 are used by students and teachers. During the last 5 years the college has devoted 7.64% of its expenditure in up-gradation and maintenance of IT facilities.

Science departments have a total of 20 well-equipped laboratories including the computer laboratories. There is a DBT-BOOST funded Central Instrumentation Facility and another UGC-funded Chemistry research laboratory equipped with sophisticated instruments for research.

The Central library located in 2nd floor is spacious covering an area of 157.8 sq mts and has 18755 books, including a good number of rare and old books. Additionally there are departmental libraries. There is reading space which is used by students and faculties. Library is automated using KOHA, ILMS and OPAC services and has institutional membership to N-List.

The college had subscriptions to G-suite and Zoom (used extensively during the pandemic) and also has its own YouTube channel, twitter handle, Facebook and Instagram accounts.

The College provides facilities such as gymnasium, canteen, reprographic facility, backup generator and common rooms for boys and girls with indoor games. There are wheel-chair, ramp and toilets for differently abled persons. A functional sanitary napkin vending machine in women's toilet is also available.

In an attempt to uphold Sustainable Development Goals, the College maintains a Janaki Ammal Sacred Grove, a medicinal garden, solar panels on the roof-top, a rainwater harvesting system as well as a vermicomposting pit. In order to support innovation, entrepreneurship and placement, the college harbours an incubation centre for mushroom culture, an office each for the Career Counselling and Placement Cell, Institute Innovation Cell and NSS Unit.

An ICT-enabled Conference Room is available for holding meetings.

Student Support and Progression

The College provides students with a comprehensive scholarship programme. In addition to the government,

the college fund also awards full or partial free-ship freeships to support marginalized students in continuation of education and to reduce the dropout rate.

It offers programmes that enhance soft skills, language and communication, life skills, and computing skills to prepare students for success through workshops, seminars, and training. These enhance students' communication, problem-solving, leadership, and creativity skills in order to prepare them for modern life. Career counselling and recruitment are organized under the agencies the Career counselling and Placement Cell to give direction to their career prospects. Online Telegram groups – "Goal Achievers" (2020, 2021-22, 2022-23) have been developed to inform students about job notifications.

It has active students' grievance redressal mechanisms that help them seek redressal for complaints. We prioritise stakeholder dignity and strive to create a safe and welcoming environment where all can flourish without fear or prejudice. The Students Grievance Redressal Committee (SGRC) takes appropriate actions for redressal. In case the person is unwilling to appear in self, grievances may be dropped in writing at the letterbox/ suggestion box of the Grievance committee. Students' concerns are also addressed through Anti-Ragging Committees, Internal Complaint Cell etc. The college observes zero tolerance to sexual harassment. In this regard we must acknowledge that no incident of sexual harassment and ragging happened in our college during the last five years.

We encourage students to participate in sports and cultural programmes in order to promote their talents which contribute to the overall development of our students and foster a vibrant campus culture.

In the last five years 81 cultural and sports activities have been organized. Students represent the college in inter-college activities and bring honour to the college. The College also facilitates students' representation and engagement in various administrative and co-curricular activities through student representation from the student body.

The college has a registered active Alumni Association that facilitates support to the students. It has instituted academic prizes for students topping in honours subjects at the university examinations. The association arranges Seminar, Symposia and cultural programmes every year.

Governance, Leadership and Management

- With a vision to achieve excellence in higher education, Brahmananda Keshab Chandra College believes in imparting education in a holistic environment that works to foster a student's all-round growth and development. The mission is to provide a dynamic and flexible educational experience in response to the growing demand for multidisciplinary education. Following the university guidelines, the college has successfully implemented NEP-2020 from the academic session 2023-24.
- College has been functioning and rendering services as per Statutes of the affiliating university. Service rules and regulations are in accordance with the UGC-MHRD mandates and Department of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal. The Governing Body, with the Principal as the secretary, governs the overall management of the college in compliance with the opinion of the majority of the members. Keeping with the vision and mission of the college the Governing Body implements the policies of participative management in decision making.

- The institution implements e-governance in all major areas like administrative, finance and accounts, student admission and examination. The accounts of the college are audited regularly through Internal and External Audit to ensure continuous and proper monitoring of financial transactions.
- For professional development of faculty members, the college encourages the faculty to participate in different courses, workshops, undertake research projects and publish papers in reputed Research Journals.
- Career advancement of teaching and non-teaching staff of the college is pursued according to the university statutes and rules framed by the UGC and State Government. For qualitative improvement all round appraisal of teachers is conducted. The appraisal is conducted through individual performance appraisal of teacher and feedback from students. Teaching and non-teaching staff members are encouraged to participate in Faculty development Programmes on a regular basis.
- The institution undertakes various welfare measures for the teaching and non-teaching staff at the institutional level and also participates in different available government welfare schemes.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Internal Complaints Committee, IQAC and Equal Opportunity Cell, in College, organize seminars, workshops, movie shows for promoting gender equity and gender sensitization. Gender audits done annually. Days and events like Independence Day, Republic Day, Rabindra Jayanti, World Environment Day etc. are celebrated. The institution provides eco-friendly facilities like Solar panels, Rainwater Harvesting and disabled-friendly environment through facilities like ramps, wheelchair etc. Green campus initiatives include swachhta activities, plantation drives and campus cleaning, awareness campaigns, environment consciousness. Green, Energy and Environment audits are also undertaken. Beyond the campus environmental promotion activities include sapling distribution, health camps, dengue awareness campaign etc. For an inclusive environment, the college undertakes measures like financial aid to needy students, monitors students' mental and physical health, celebrates basanta Utsab, Saraswati puja etc. Activities like students' participation in cultural programmes, poetry reading sessions and thalassemia screening camps sensitize students and employees.

The institution maintains a sustainable environment through initiatives like campaigns for a plastic free campus, afforestation, vaccination drive for Covid-19 infection, use of solar cells and waste management. Community outreach programmes like distribution of mosquito net, distribution of food packets, masks, education kit in adjacent slums of the College, free health check-up camp for slum children. The college is registered under Swachhta Action Plan, MGNCRE-MHRD Ministry of Education, Govt. of India. The college has received "Green Champion' award 2021 for its green campus initiatives. The College maintains 'Janaki Ammal Sacred Grove', a site for in situ conservation of biodiversity.

Brahmananda Keshab Chandra College, affiliated with West Bengal State University, Barasat, is committed to provide a dynamic and flexible educational experience aligned with contemporary demands. As part of the university's initiative, the college operates within the framework of the Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS), allowing students the freedom to customise their learning journey according to their interests and career aspirations. Moreover, in response to the growing demand for multidisciplinary education, the university recently introduced a curriculum emphasizing interdisciplinary learning under the New Education Policy (NEP 2020) from the academic session of

2023-24. As an affiliated college, Brahmananda Keshab Chandra College has embraced this initiative, ensuring that its educational offerings reflect the evolving landscape of higher education. As per University directives students have to opt for Multidisciplinary courses as well as Value Added courses and Skill development courses, apart from their Major and Minor disciplines, as a part of holistic learning approach under NEP 2020. The college offers a diverse range of academic programs to cater to the varied needs of students. This includes Honours/Major Undergraduate courses in 13 departments, providing in-depth study and specialization in specific subjects. Additionally, General/Minor Undergraduate courses are available in 18 departments, offering a broader foundation across various disciplines. For those seeking advanced education, Postgraduate programs are offered in three departments, allowing students to delve deeper into their chosen field. Recognizing the importance of holistic development, the college goes beyond traditional academics to offer Add on/Certificate courses that align with emerging national and global trends while also addressing local needs. These courses are designed to supplement the existing curriculum and equip students with relevant skills and knowledge for the ever-evolving job market. Thus, by adhering to the university's guidelines, the college strives to provide a wellrounded education that prepares students to excel in a rapidly changing world.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The college is currently in the process of enhancing its Student Management Software to align with the requirements of the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) as outlined in the National Education Policy (NEP) of 2020. However, the decision to implement the Academic Bank of Credits rests with the West Bengal State University, to which the college is affiliated. As per university regulations, the college is prepared to introduce the ABC system as it has recently received a directive from the university authorities. The college remains committed to adhering to the curricula and guidelines set forth by the university while ensuring that its systems and processes are in place to accommodate any forthcoming changes in accordance with NEP 2020 directives.

3. Skill development:

In response to the growing demand for skilled workforce in both public and private sectors, higher education institutions are adapting their curricula. It's essential to equip students with not only degrees in their chosen fields but also additional skill sets for entrepreneurial endeavours. Within the Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS) as well as the NEP 2020 system, each department offers Skill Enhancement Courses, ensuring that all students complete at least two different SEC courses before graduating, with 4 credits allotted to these courses. Furthermore, our institution offers skill-based various certificate courses that align with global and local trends, supplementing the curriculum and preparing students for the dynamic job market. Key courses include: Basic Computer Literacy Courses, Soft skill development and communicative English, Basic techniques in Biotechnology, Aquarium management, Mushroom cultivation, Biomonitoring of water pollution, Detection of Food adulteration, Microbial Quality Control in Food and Pharmaceutical Industries, Introduction to LaTex for Scientific Writing, Content writing and specialised reporting, Basics of Data Analysis Faunal Diversity assessment and related issues Solving Problems related to Mathematics, Mental aptitude and Logical Reasoning Film Studies Media and Communication

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

The institution integrates Indian knowledge systems into its undergraduate programs across 19 disciplines under the Choice Based Credit System. Courses emphasize Indian heritage, culture, and values, with instruction primarily in Bengali or bilingual (English and Bengali). Key initiatives include: Department of Sanskrit offers certificate course for learning Brahmi and Sarada script Humanities programs explore Indian philosophy, culture, ethics, laws, and logic. Indian language courses (e.g., Bengali, Sanskrit) delve into narratives, mythology, and folklore, imparting knowledge of Indian ethics and values. SEC courses like Ethnobotany and natural resource management offered by department of Botany delve into the rich tapestry of ancient wisdom and traditional practices, sustainable utilisation of plant resources and the need to harmonise human needs with ecological balance Celebration of International Yoga Day further fosters our commitment to holistic education and well being. Provision for Yoga and

meditation as Value added course (VAC) into mainstream education in the newly introduced NEP 2020 syllabus and approved by our affiliating university (WBSU) aims to enhance students' holistic development, promoting physical fitness, mental clarity, and stress management but will also help to bridge the gap between traditional wisdom and modern learning paradigms. History, Political Science, and Economics syllabi include India's rich history. Certificate courses offered by the department of Philosophy delve into Indian philosophy, culture, and ethics, complimenting students' education beyond class hours. 5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has been diligently implementing an outcome-based education framework in accordance with UGC guidelines. This involves departments meticulously crafting both program and course outcomes, which are then made readily accessible on the institution's website and departmental web pages. Furthermore, instructors ensure these outcomes are integrated into their lesson plans, providing students with a clear understanding of the skills and knowledge they can expect to gain from each course. Through continuous internal evaluation, teachers are able to monitor and assess students' progress throughout the course. This process not only helps identify areas where students may be struggling but also recognizes those who excel, facilitating tailored teaching methods to meet individual needs. 6. Distance education/online education: The institution provides ICT-based teaching and learning infrastructure, catering to both online and offline educational formats. Teachers utilize sophisticated learning management system software to effectively manage curriculum delivery, from elearning resources to assessment. Proficiency in these technological tools as well as the other platforms available through the internet is a standard among all faculty members, ensuring their capability to deliver high-quality online education. Certificate courses offered by departments are conducted in a hybrid mode. This proactive approach to online instruction since COVID days has positioned the institution well for the online and distance education.

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

The College has an Academic Calendar, a College Routine and, department timetables of the various departments. The Curriculum is designed by the affiliating University and several faculty members of the College are members of the Boards of Studies of the various departments and are involved in the syllabus framing done by the affiliating university.

The College offers Add On Courses whose syllabus and guidelines are decided by the departments offering the courses.

Minutes of meetings of the various sub committees are regularly and meticulously maintained. Teachers maintain their individual self appraisal data as well.

Remedial classes are part of the regular teaching learning system and is a practice followed by all departments in the College. Departments also have a mentoring system in place that works by meeting and talking to students regularly and offers advice and guidance as and when required.

Regular parent teacher meetings are held. The IQAC of the College organizes them and departments also meet the parents separately updating information on students' performance, attendance, result, etc.

A continuous assessment system is in place. Internal examinations are held centrally to help facilitate smooth conduct of examinations. Class tests, viva, presentations are held as well. Several departments organize annual student seminars. The department of English, for instance, has been organizing an Annual Students Seminar since 2004 (with a gap of just one year) where students of the 2nd year (3rd/4th semester) present papers and engage in interactive discussions. 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

Response:

The College follows the syllabus framed by the West Bengal State University to which the College is affiliated. Several components of the syllabi of several courses taught in the College include issues relevant to gender, environment and sustainability, human values and professional ethics with a view to creating a value-based all round development of students. Several activities are also organized in these areas throughout the year in the College in order to create a holistic teaching learning experience in the College.

Gender

Gender related courses are an integral component of various courses taught in the College. For instance, the English Honours programme has a special paper in semester 5 that is entirely focussed on women's writing. Also several components that focus on gender are also part of the English honours syllabus of other semesters as well. Bengali Honours curriculum also approaches gender issues through medieval and modern literature. Gender also features in the Political Science curriculum as well. The ICC of the College organizes talks, awareness programmes, film shows and poster exhibitions to sensitize students. All faculty, non teaching faculty and students are encouraged to work towards gender equity. The College takes initiatives in organizing seminars on gender related topics. A variety of community outreach programmes that include health and hygiene camps, slum adoption, etc enable exposure to real life situations. The NSS Unit of the College takes an active part in organizing these community outreach programmes.

Professional Ethics and Human Values

To create social awareness among the students, lectures and quiz contests, essay competitions, etc. are organized by the NSS and other cells/committees of the College. The College takes efforts to work towards an integration of ethical and human values through various extra-curricular activities as well. Guest lectures on value education have been organized for students, both in the physical and online mode. National festivals like Independence Day and Republic Day serve as a reminder of a feeling of being part of one country and working towards the growth and development of the country and are celebrated with great fervour in the college. Several social activities have been initiated by the college like Blood donation camps, Anti-Drug programmes, Dementia awareness programmes, Thalassemia awareness programmes, etc. The curriculum of several courses includes ideas of cultural diversity, ethics, scientific methodology, comparative study of religions, ancient and modern philosophy etc.

Environment and Sustainability

The College fosters a sustainable way of life that brings together water quality, air quality, education, healthcare, innovation and human values into its gamut. Several Add On Courses, like "Grow Your Own

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Mushroom" has made it possible to bring in ideas of sustainability and growth into classroom teaching. A compulsory course on Environment studies is included in all UG programmes. Environment awareness programmes, seminars, workshops, guest lectures, industry visits and field excursions are organized. Environment Day, Earth Day and Water Day are celebrated every year. The College has an Eco Club that engages students and faculty members in several activities that have to do with the environment and biodiversity.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

- The college organizes a general assembly at the beginning of the session to make students aware of the courses and evaluation process.
- All departments organise Induction programmes to make students aware of the syllabus and teaching modalities.
- Teachers of every department organize department meetings to discuss the different teaching methods specific to the syllabus, identify the slow learners, and make arrangements for their remedial classes.
- Besides the conventional lecture delivery method and chalk use, interactive method, assignment
 and project-based learning, the departments adopt ICT-based tools like smart classrooms, Google
 classrooms, PowerPoint presentations, etc. These different teaching methods enhance the
 students' learning process and improve the course outcome.
- Formal allotment of teachers as mentors has been introduced to establish a better and more effective relationship between students and teachers and address their academic, financial, and personal crisis.
- During the pandemic, audio-visual digital platforms such as Zoom, Google Meet, WhatsApp, Skype, etc., were used for teaching. Google Workplace and Google Classroom were extensively used to provide additional flexibility to students.
- Classroom teaching methods, both online and offline, are always student-centric. ICT tools, such as meetings and different activities, are essential in collaborative work.
- The departments, other cells, and committees organized several webinars, workshops, and special lectures.
- The college started using a YouTube channel for webinar broadcasts, which helped to increase student participation.
- A few departments also used their YouTube channels to upload tutorial lecture videos.
- After the pandemic scenario, to continue with the blended mode of teaching-learning, the institution provides the best possible internet facilities on the college campus.
- Parent-teacher meetings were also organized online and offline to communicate with the parents regarding the academic and moral improvement of the students.
- Webinar on The Students' Mental Health during the time of pandemic was also organized. During the pandemic, the teachers motivated the students to overcome the agony and the mental depression by nurturing their creative abilities.
- The library's enrichment with OPAC and N-LIST subscriptions has helped teachers and students access various journals and books.
- Many departments organize field trips and excursions as a part of the course curriculum. The Zoology, IFF, and Botany departments have yearly field study programs for the students. They also visit different research institutes and industries.
- Apart from the science departments, departments of Political Science, Economics, and Philosophy have organized educational tours for the students' practical experience.
- Poetry Reading Session organized by the Department of English is an event where all students, irrespective of any stream, are invited to read their self-composed poems. This event encourages the students to become budding poets who get a platform to express their thoughts and enhance their creative ability.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The constitutive part of the teaching-learning process is accomplished with the internal examination's pivotal role in the new CBCS syllabus. The college follows an evaluation structure directed by West Bengal State University.

- Along with the regular Unit Tests, the Project-based evaluation and Home Assignment are also a part of the evaluation process. This helps to identify the weaknesses of students.
- To encourage participatory learning, various departments organize seminars for students who get the provision to participate and present papers, too.
- Wall Magazine is a regular activity for a few departments that encourages students to engage with different topics and themes.
- For the Science department, regular practical sessions play an important role in continuous assessment.
- PG departments of the college have introduced seminar presentations as a part of assessment in their curriculum.
- During the pandemic, besides the teaching mechanisms, the departments have continued their internal evaluation process through online platforms like Zoom, Google Meet, Google Forms, and Google Classrooms. Both descriptive questions and MCQ patterns were taken up as the means of assessment. The MCQ pattern's auto-generated marking system helped maintain evaluation transparency.
- The practical-based departments have given practical internal examinations through online viva voce through video calls on online platforms.
- In matters of grievances related to assessment, they were immediately addressed by the respective faculty of the departments.
- The Academic Calendar is prepared and circulated among all institution stakeholders during the

commencement of the session each year, mentioning the dates of the Mid-term, Internals, and End-semester examinations, which helps the teachers deal with the syllabus in the stipulated time. Also, it helps the students to prepare themselves for examinations.

- The academic calendar also has the dates of different college activities like annual sports, student freshman welcome, and college socials by the college's students' union.
- An academic calendar for PG departments is also prepared for the convenience of the respective departments.
- The individual departments also take the initiative to put the examination notice on notice boards specifying the dates of the examination, and the students get notified by uploading them on the college website and sharing them with the different WhatsApp student groups.
- The university conducts the End-semester examination. The dates and external venue of the end-semester are notified on the university website, which is further uploaded on the college website.
- Grievances related to the end-semester examination also get addressed by the Grievance Redressal Cell, who additionally help the students apply for revising the answer scripts and file RTI if required.

Response:

The evaluation of attainment of PSO and CO is primarily made based on the performances of the students in summative and formative assessments in the courses.

- Formative assessment is used throughout an instructional period to treat misconceptions, struggles, and learning gaps.
- Summative assessment of student learning, knowledge, proficiency, or success after a program on various courses is made through the continuous assessment (internal examination) and end semester examination result of the affiliating university.
- Student wise attainment grades of different courses are calculated. The weightage given to internal examination marks is 20% while the weightage of the end semester marks is 80%.
- The course outcome attainment index for individual is based on some benchmark values. The threshold percentage for individual course attainment is taken as 40% i. e. pass marks.
- The overall course outcome attainment index is based on some benchmark values. The threshold percentage for overall course attainment is 50%.
- If less than 50% students of the class score at least 50% marks, attainment score of course is one, and the score varies between 2 to 4 depending on the percentage of students attaining 50% on CO.
- The course outcome attainment values along with the course outcome program outcome mapping helps in evaluating the course and program outcome and the overall attainment of the subject.

The student progression into higher studies, placement records and their achievements in other activities also indicate successful attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1

The Institution has adequate infrastructure and other facilities for,

- teaching learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc
- ICT enabled facilities such as smart class, LMS etc.

Facilities for Cultural and sports activities, yoga centre, games (indoor and outdoor), Gymnasium, auditorium etc (Describe the adequacy of facilities in maximum of 500 words.)

Response:

- Brahmananda Keshab Chandra College covers a total area of approximately 6 acres. It comprises of a three storied main building, an Annex building, a three storied Women's Hostel, staff quarters and a large, fenced, lush green playground, measuring about 8651 sqmts. The buildup area accounts for 5367 sqmts. which includes the main building, annex building and the Women's Hostel.
- The campus is under CCTV surveillance and is enabled with Wi-Fi connectivity. Attendance of all staffs is maintained through Biometric System. Availability of EPABX facility for internal communication.
- There are 39 well ventilated and Wi-Fi enabled classrooms, of which 12 classrooms have ICT facility with fixed projection system and two are smart classrooms. There are 2 movable-projectors which are used as and when required. Large classrooms are used for organizing seminars/conferences, university-examinations. Amongst the 39 classrooms, 5 were added in this tenure to cater to the class requirements as per CBCS-curriculum. An ICT-enabled Conference Room is available for holding meetings.
- Science departments possess a total of 20 well-equipped laboratories including the computer laboratories. The departments of Physics, Mathematics, Computer science, Fishery Science, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany and Molecular Biology and Biotechnology have 4, 1, 1, 1, 5, 2, 5 and 1 laboratories respectively. Sufficient number of instruments were purchased for the commencement of Postgraduate course in Physics in this tenure and also the Hiralal Chaudhury Laboratory was established by the department of Fishery Science.
- The college boasts of a Central instrumentation Facility funded by DBT-BOOST equipped with sophisticated instruments for research for all life science departments and a well-equipped Chemistry research laboratory funded by UGC.
- The college has gained authorized subscription for G-suite and Zoom for conducting online classes, examinations, events, and meetings etc. especially during the COVID-19 pandemic period. The college has its YouTube channel (https://www.youtube.com/@bkccollege_classroom1687), a facebook (https://www.facebook.com/profile.php?id=100064008216899&mibextid=ZbWKwL) and an instagram account (https://www.instagram.com/bkc_college?igsh=MXh3b3RkNjVxbHF1MA==) and a twitter handle (https://twitter.com/BKCCollege) of its own.
- The Central library is automated and has a huge collection of books (18755) including rare books and is also subscribed toN-LIST. All departments have seminar libraries with books of regular

need.

- There is a gymnasium (33.5 sqm), a two-wheeler stand, a canteen facility and common rooms for boys and girls with facilities of indoor games. West Bengal State University hosted an inter-College Table tennis and Chess competition in 2018-19, 2019-20 using this infrastructure.
- The Janaki Ammal Sacred Grove is maintained as a carbon sink along with a medicinal garden beside it. Solar panels (15 KWP) in the roof-top for eco-friendly renewable energy source, a Rainwater harvesting system for water conservation and a Vermicomposting pit are available.
- There is a Reprographic Centre and a Backup generator facility (24KW).
- Wheel chair and ramp for differently abled persons, separate PWD toilets for men and women and sanitary napkin vending machine in women's toilet are available.
- There is an incubation centre for mushroom culture, an office each for the Career Counselling and Placement Cell, Institute Innovation Cell and NSS Unit.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

The Central Library, located in 2nd floor is spacious covering an area of 157.8 sq mts with approximately 18755 books, including good number of rare and old books. The number of books in the library is on the increase owing to annual purchases, keeping in view the changes brought about in the syllabi of various subjects and the needs of the students. Moreover, departmental libraries are there for each department. From 2018 to 2023 library procured 399 books, received 133 books as donation and 1044 books through UGC Research Projects of faculties. The library is open during usual college hours.

The Library has reading space which is used by students and faculties. There is a separate display for newspapers and separate almirahs for stacking of journals.

Library Automation

- Library is automated fully using ILMS Koha software (3.14 version) which was installed in 2016. Recently the software has been upgraded to Version 23.05.04.
- This software has been cloud hosted in 2022. The entire library collection is being processed into the database.
- In the month of February 2023 OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) service has been introduced to our members. Through this they are able to know which books are available in our college library.
- Automated circulation of books for users has been initiated from 06-02-23.
- Automated Library attendance is mandatory for library users, initiated in the month of February 2023.

Access control system

- The entire library (Reading Room & Stack Room) is under CCTV surveillance.
- Library is enabled with LAN, Internet connectivity and Wi-Fi system.

E-Services

• Our college has continuous institutional membership of N-List and students and teachers can use e-Journals & e- Books services through it.

Book Fairs and Seminars:

• A book fair (30.07.19 ? 0308.19) was organized in the library reading room in collaboration with IQAC where Parul Prakashani, a leading publisher participated. The library as well as many

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- students and teachers purchased books according to the needs.
- To educate our students and faculties towards new books on their subjects a book fair was arranged for two days (11th& 12th May 2023). Total 9 publishers (Paschimbanga Itihas Sansad, Alphabet, K.P.Bagchi, Setu, Book Post, Progressive, MRP Book Distributor, Books & Allied LTD., Avenel) displayed their books on various subjects.
- To celebrate World Books & Copyright Day (23.04.2023) the History Department and The Library of our college and PCM Mahavidyalaya in collaboration with Paschimbanga Itihas Sansad organized a Seminar on the topic "Past & Preserve: Use of modern technologies in archives and library".

Library Induction Program

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1

Institution frequently updates its IT facilities and provides sufficient bandwidth for internet connection

Response:

Brahmananda Keshab Chandra College consistently emphasizes on providing adequate IT facilities for academic as well as administrative support and ensures maintenance and up-gradation of these facilities. Around 7.64 % of total expenditure is used for this purpose.

Network and Connectivity:

Main building and annex building is currently enabled with internet services of 100 Mbps bandwidth working with a system of 22 routers. Parallel services are taken from Alliance and BSNL broadband for better connectivity. Separate services from Alliance broadband are provided to Women's Hostel. Computers of Principal's Office, student's section, Library and different departments are also supported by LAN facilities. An EPABX system with 25 receivers is available. All these are duly monitored by technical assistants.

• Vigilance

A total of 37 CCTV cameras are installed in the campus and Women's Hostel for better surveillance. Attendance of Staffs are monitored through the biometric system.

• ICT and Computer Facility

The College has a total of 14 ICT enabled classrooms including 2 smart rooms and also a Conference room. This facility has been increased over the years with only 9 ICT-enabled rooms that were present in 2018-2019. Additionally, we have 2 movable projectors which can be used as and when required.

The College has a total of computers, of which 41 are used for students as well as faculty. During the last 5 years we have added a total of 17 desktops and laptops to the existing ones. Computers and printers were purchased from the MPLAD fund for commencement of Post Graduate course in Physics.

Old and irreparable computers and other e-wastes were discarded through Hulladeck in 2022-2023.

Softwares and e-resources

The College Automation System (CAS 7.1) developed by Aidni Infotech Pvt. Ltd is used for admission and student administration and Online Admission Software (OAS) is used for the admission of 1st semester. Post graduate result is prepared in Smart ERP module.

The College accounts are maintained by Tally Prime. To access this software remotely Biz-Analyst, an add-on software for Tally Prime was purchased during pandemic.

Library is automated fully using ILMS Koha software (3.14 version) which was installed in 2016. Recently the software was upgraded to version 23.05.04 and has been cloud hosted in 2022. The entire library collection is being processed into the database. Online Public Access Catalogue service has been introduced from February 2023. Automated circulation of books and library attendance for users has been initiated from February 2023. Library has subscription to N-LIST.

The College had been registered with G-Suite (08.09.2020) and ZOOM software (18.09.2020) and also with a YouTube channel (https://www.youtube.com/@bkccollege_classroom1687) in 2020 which were extensively used during the Pandemic.

College has an online Feed-Back system for stake holders.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Our college is Government Sponsored (Grant-in Aid) College and is affiliated to West Bengal State University. The financial resources are available from State Government of West Bengal and college fund.

The institution mobilizes the funds from salary Grants, non-salary grants, fee collection from students.

Time to time college obtained development grant from MPLAD and Higher Education, WB.

College utilizes overhead charges of major research project and consultancy for development of Laboratories.

Often college generate funds by conducting different academic events through registration charges.

All the transactions and expenditures on recurring or non-recurring incurred through the banks, online

transactions mode, PFMS, cheques and vouchers. Various software systems as part of e-governance are used for financial transparency and accountability.

Institution has established defined procedures and processes for planning and allocation of financial resources.

- The institution has developed strategies for mobilizing resources and has ensured transparency in financial management of the institution conducting regularly internal and external financial audit.
- Financial matters are routed through Accountant and monitored by the Principal in consultation with Finance committee of Governing Body.
- The Finance Committee of Governing Body prepares the annual budget every year by taking into consideration of recurring and nonrecurring expenditures.
- The college has constituted separate Purchase committee governed by the Principal, Bursar and the members of purchase committee. Regular meetings are conducted for the financial evaluation such as fund generation, mobilization and utilization.
- Most of the purchasing and maintenance are done according to the decision of purchase committee. Prior to attaining of items and services tenders inviting quotations are uploaded in college website. Decisions are taken in purchase committee meeting comparing price and quality of requisite items mentioned in received quotations in usual manner.
- The bill payments are passed after testing & verification of items or services.
- Only GB approved authorized members of the institution operate the transaction through bank.
- Transparency is maintained throughout the entire process and allocated funds are optimally utilized. For each Government funding Utilization Certificates prepared by Government registered Chartered Accountant is submitted within stipulated period.
- All the financial transactions are properly analyzed and verified by the Principal, Accountant, and Bursar.
- IT and GST returns are submitted every year within the stipulated filing date.
- It is a continuous process in which a government registered Chartered Accountant is appointed by the institution to conduct regular audit of all college accounts and certifies its Annual Financial Statements. All utilization certificates of various grant giving agencies are also counter signed by the CA. All financial statements up to current year 2022-2023 have been certified by the CA for the purpose of **internal audit**.
- The external audit is carried out by an auditor appointed by the Govt. of West Bengal. External

audit for the F.Y. 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 are done.

• Finally, all the reports are placed before the Finance Sub-committee and endorsed by GB.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. Response:

Since its inception the IQAC has played a very important role to consistently improve the performance of the institution by monitoring and taking necessary actions with a view to improve available facilities for its stakeholders.

- The IQAC also monitors the academic and administrative activities of the college. Our college performs Academic & Administrative Audit, Green Audit, Energy Audit and Gender Audit under the supervision of IQAC.
- It prepares Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) as per guidelines of NAAC.
- IQAC takes initiatives to finalize a comprehensive **Academic Calendar** at the beginning of the academic session.
- Academic Plan is prepared by the departments on the basis of Academic Calendar. A consolidated and Structured Routine is prepared for each semester by the routine committee under the supervision of IQAC. Mentor, mentees for each class are set to guide the students properly.
- The IQAC had also developed CO-PO modalities that helps teachers to frame teaching methodology with futuristic approach for improved learning outcomes.
- IQAC also implemented Learning Management System (LMS) in the institution to ensure quality learning among the learners through centralized study materials, video lessons and academic plan.
- The IQAC of the college gives primary importance to **career guidance** of students by organizing career fairs, seminars and direct placement events through the Career Counselling and Placement

Cell.

- To increase academic industry interaction IQAC conducted student **visit to MSME** Tool room, Bon Hooghly.
- IQAC works towards quality improvement of teachers through encouragement in research activities. It encourages faculty member to undertake research projects, publish papers in reputed Research Journals and also pursue PhD work. 5 (five) faculty members had been awarded PhD during the period 2018- 2023.
- For qualitative improvement all round **appraisal of teachers** is conducted. The appraisal is conducted through individual performance appraisal of teacher and feedback from students. Necessary suggestions are given based on this information for improving the performance of the concerned teacher.
- Feedbacks are collected through Guardian meeting, regular annual reunion of alumni and analyzed for smooth running of Academic and Administrative activities.
- For promotional benefits under Career Advancement Scheme (CAS), Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) of faculties is checked and verified by the IQAC. It maintains records of Self-Appraisal Forms from teaching and non-teaching staff.
- The IQAC regularly organized several outreach programmes. Activities like welfare programmes for the adopted slum are conducted along with the NSS unit of the college.
- IQAC took initiative and helped the process of filling up vacant teaching and non-teaching posts in the college.
- IQAC organized several Faculty Development Programme and staff training programme, add on courses, state and national level seminars, workshops on issues related to academics, administration, gender awareness, IPR, Physical and Mental health, career guidance and environment.

Regional and Cultural inclusiveness

Each year, different cultural and regional festivals like Basanta Utsav, Durga Puja agomoni, Saraswati puja, are celebrated. Rabindra Jayanti, Nazrul jayanti, Baishe Shrabon, are also celebrated every year. - The Department of English offers a course "English Language Teaching" and an Add-on course "English for Communication" that help the students to learn communication skills and creative writing.

Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual

Response:

7.2.1 BEST PRACTICE -I

Title: STUDENTS' WELFARE FUND OF TEACHERS COUNCIL

Objectives:

The creation of the Teachers Council Welfare Fund for reaching out to students who are underprivileged and belong to financially weak backgrounds. In the Covid-19 pandemic situation, economic hardship faced by the families of some of our students. College was very much concerned that no student would discontinue their studies due to lack of funds. To help the students from marginalized backgrounds complete their studies. The Teachers' Council of Brahmananda Keshab Chandra College has decided to help the needy students to overcome the hardship regarding monetary issues faced by them in carrying out their online classes and education.

The context:

As part of a social responsibility initiative on the part of the College the idea of having such a fund was mooted. As the situation worsened with the second wave of COVID -19 and the continued economic uncertainties of a large section of our student community, the council members took the decision to build a "Student Welfare Fund" from individual donations under the supervision of the Secretary. The decision was made in an online TC meeting on 5th May, 2020. Applications from Sem 2 and 4 undergraduate and postgraduate students were invited and data packs that were recharged so that they do not find difficulty in attending the online classes. This programme was continued in the 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 session also.

The Practice:

In the session 2021-22 Teachers' Council spent around Rs 58,000/- from its fund towards payment of tuition fees, examination fees and data recharge of mobile phones of students for attending online classes. Council paid tuition fees and university examination fees of 43 students from both arts and science stream. Data recharge helped students to carry on with their online classes and other activities.

Evidence of Success:

While taking online classes, teachers found that some students are regularly absent from their classes as they are unable to recharge their mobile data pack. So it was decided that the foremost thing will be to help the students to continue with their online classes. Recently, data pack recharge, valid for eighty four days, was done for 53 students and around Rs 30,199/- was spent. The activities of Student Welfare Fund were carried till the end of 2023.

Problems encountered and Resource Required: collecting authentic data of needy students in a lockdown situation was very difficult. Though committee members collected all information required through google form along with proper documents and proof. Initially the pace raising fund was slow but later the fund more teachers contributed and a good amount was raised. Disbursement of the fund properly following the data was another challenge in a pandemic situation. Still committee members gave their sincere efforts and managed to do that via online platforms. A few students missed the opportunity which we came to know later.

Best Practice II

Title: SERVING THE NEIGHBOURS: COMMUNITY OUTREACH FOR CREATING HEALTHY SOCIETY

Objectives:

- A healthy mind and healthy body are important steps towards strong nation building. Spreading cheer and positivity is what the college aspires to be.
- Commitment to the local community has been an important area that the college is interested in working on.
- The College works to foster commitment towards the local neighbourhood in an attempt to bring about a social and economic transformation of the community structure through the efforts of our institution.

Context:

The College is one of the very few institutions that have a huge playground. The verdant surroundings are a delight to anyone who enters the college campus. This playground is used regularly by our students for their games and sports. The College has always been in favour of using available resources in such a way that the local community could benefit from it as well. It was but natural that the wonderful,

expansive playground would be thus put to use as well. The well preserved playground is a wonderful open space in the concrete all around.

At every juncture in its long history, the college has worked to make the most of the available circumstances and resources. In its efforts to be inclusive, to be part of the local community, to work towards creating good physical and mental health of the people in the area, college has incorporated one of its best practices into healthy practices for all its stakeholders and the community as well. Higher educational institutions are expected to work and build on healthy practices in order to work towards societal transformation.

The Practice:

Several schools, organizations and clubs in the neighbourhood and surrounding area have been allowed to use the college playground for their several activities mostly free of cost. Annual sports, several championships, training events take place in the playground. These organizations and schools make use of the playground after seeking necessary permission from the College authorities. The College strongly believes in the idea that a healthy mind and healthy body are important steps towards strong nation building. The college wants to be a place where happiness and optimism are shared.

Evidence of Success:

College ground was in use by the local Residents, schools, institutions for many years for conducting sports, events, exercise, morning and evening walk etc. without proper documentation and regulation. But after the guardwall construction in 2016 and fencing in 2022, events are taking place in a more regulated and proper manner. College can keep records of the events taking place in the playground as beneficiaries have to put in an application for permission from the college authority.

Problems encountered and resources required

- Escalating costs of maintenance of the playground is a major issue. Fencing, levelling the ground , removing weeds and mowing regularly is a huge financial burden.
- Local people and children often tend to use the playground beyond the stipulated time causing distraction to college activities.
- The rapid growth of invasive weeds, particularly in the rainy season is a major cause for concern as it becomes difficult to use the ground unless weeds are removed.
- Monetary resources are of utmost importance for the maintenance of the huge playground.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1

Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

'Janaki Ammal Scared Grove'- A In Situ Biodiversity Conservation and Maintenance Effort in a Highly Urbanised Area.

Higher Education Institutes (HEIs) have an all-encompassing role of nation-building by empowering youths with the much-needed knowledge, values, and training for leading a fulfilling life and positively impacting the society. The HEIs are the cradle for creating tools for the advancement of knowledge and progress of mankind. The HEIs can ignite young minds towards aspirations to reach outer space as well as manage the well-being of our planet Earth. Courses such as Plant Ecology, Environmental Studies, Natural Resource Management, and others expose the younger generation to Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

• Sacred groves are a traditional approach of biodiversity conservation where a community does not disturb a patch of forest considering it to be sacred. It is believed that the Van-Devi or forest deity would be offended and punish the person who disturbs or takes anything from that forest. Sacred groves are found all around the world. The undisturbed condition of the sacred grove makes it a relic of forest ecosystems and provides a safe haven for wild flora and fauna in the age of concrete jungles.

Maintaining Biodiversity:

Plantation drives are organized by Swacchta Action Plan Committee and NSS unit at Regular intervals to enhance green coverage and increasing plant biodiversity. This way landscaping is also done by planting trees, shrubs and creepers to maintain a hue soothing for mind and eyes. College has a Sacred Grove which helps to maintain floral and faunal diversity to a great extent. Slashing and burning of invasive plant species is done on a regular basis to maintain the diversity of native plant species.

• The college is a green campus and GREEN can acronymically be called as "Global Readiness in Ensuring Ecological Neutrality". The BKC College is committed to conserve an area of 01 (one) hectare as Biodiversity Conservation Site. The Sir Jagadish Chandra Bose Eco Club of Botany Department, BKC College innovated a sustainable approach to Biodiversity Conservation by setting up a Sacred Grove within the college premises in 2016.

- The college administration pledges to conserve this area as an institutional In-Situ Biodiversity Conservation Site through the Conservation Policy (Ref: BKCC/GB-Agg 2//Green Policy/2017 dated 08.09.2017.)
- This grove has been named after the renowned botanist Edavalath Kakkat Janaki Ammal as 'Janaki Ammal Sacred Grove (JASG)' to inspire the young minds towards natural science and biodiversity conservation.
- The Green team of Swachata Action Plan (SAP) Committee of the college, an initiative of Ministry of Education, GoI, is maintaining the grove along with the Eco-Club from 2020.
- The lockdown of 2020 was proof that the biodiversity of the college campus is unique and the sacred grove became a safe haven and wetland corridor for the migratory bird *Cocinia cocinia*. The trees in the campus especially those of the Janaki Ammal Sacred grove became the playground for the paradise flycatcher, Indian Cuckoo, magpie Robin, yellow footed pigeon, stork billed kingfisher, white crested kingfisher, oriole, barbet, owls, eagle, kite, parrot, greater coucal etc. and around 36 species of butterfly. Faunal diversity assessment was done by the Department of Zoology. In the grove 3 species of amphibia, 13 species of reptiles, 55 species of birds, 11 species of mammals. Were encountered.
- The grove has been a learning ground for Ecology and Taxonomy for PG Botany and UG Botany and Zoology students. The grove is one of the criteria for bagging the 'One District One Green Champion' award from Swachhta Action Plan, MHRD, GoI in 2021 by the institution.
- The Eco Club students and Zoology addon course students regularly audit the green of the campus by systematic identification, quantification, and analysis of tree, shrub, and herbaceous components of the campus. This creates awareness among the students regarding their surroundings and the importance of species diversity. It also develops their skills for data collection and analysis to get an idea of the ecological footprint of the institute.
- The College has about 88% (21568.71 m sq) of the total area covered by different plant life forms. Of this 88%, 11% is wild forested area of the Janaki Ammal sacred grove, 50% is grass playground, 27% non- concrete areas with large trees of the college campus. A plant list of the college was prepared by collating the botanical documentation carried out from 2015 to 2022 by Eco-club members of the Botany Department. The college has rich plant diversity with 74 plant species; 30 tree species, 3 shrub species, 34 herbaceous species and 7 climber species. The number of trees in the sacred grove represents 50% of the total number of trees in the entire campus. It is interesting to note that most of these trees are age-old and were planted by the earlier administration since the establishment of the college in 1956. The tradition of increasing the plant diversity of the college continues even today.
- The college has a rich herbaceous diversity of around 45 species growing in various seasons of the year. Many of these wild species are medicinally important. Other plant species have been planted in the medicinal plant garden to enrich the medicinal plant population of the college campus.
- A gate was put up at the entrance of the sacred grove in honour of Janaki Ammal and trees are labelled with appropriate signages.

- A medicinal plant garden has been created adjacent to the sacred grove to increase the pollinator availability of the area. It also helps the student learn about the use of different medicinal plants and improve their Traditional Medicinal Knowledge/TMK.
- A museum on Janaki Ammal and flora and fauna of the grove has been established in the sacred Grove.
- A small waterbody has been renovated as a mode for recharging the ground water and also to provide water source to the birds and other species in summer.
- Students and local people are invited to visit the sacred grove and learn about community conservation practices such as the sacred grove that act as carbon sinks and contribute to mitigating global warming and climate change.

POLICY ON BIODIVERSITY CONSERVATION

Purpose: The Brahmananda Keshab Chandra College has a sprawling green campus and is committed to conserve its rich biodiversity.

Scope: In 2016, a biodiversity rich grove of the college was named as 'Janaki Ammal Sacred Grove (JASG)' after the renowned Indian botanist Edavaleth Kakkat Janaki Ammal. This initiative was undertaken by Sir Jagadish Chandra Bose Eco-Club, Department of Botany, BKC College. The aim of the sacred grove was to inspire young minds towards natural science and biodiversity conservation through innovation. The grove is one of the reasons for bagging the 'One District One Green Champion Award' by the Swachhta Action Plan (SAP) Committee registered under (MGMCRE-MHRD Govt. of India) in 2021. This grove is a wetland corridor and is a habitat for the migratory bird Ciconia ciconia (white stork). The grove serves as a learning ground for PG and UG students of the college and the neighbouring institutions.

Policy Guidelines: The college administration pledges to conserve the grove as an Institutional In-Situ Biodiversity Conservation Site. The Green team of Swachata Action Plan (SAP) Committee of the college, will maintain the grove along with the Eco-Club. The grove will continue to be a sanctuary for wild plants and animals in the semi-urban surrounding of the college campus.

Community Outreach activities

The college extends its helping hand when it comes to the need of the local community. In previous years during flood the college gave shelter to the destitues of the locality. There was a devastating fire at a slum in our municipal area adopted by our NSS. Slum dwellers were provided shelter by our College for a week with relief measures donated by students and staff much before they received support from the local municipality.

Concluding Remarks:

The college aspires to be known as an institution that promotes the academic, physical, moral and cultural development of students to make them responsible citizens of the country. Also promotes education of girl students. It has been catering to the needs of first generation learners of the local community. Since its inception in 1956 the college has rendered valuable contribution to the field of higher education among under privileged students particularly students from refugee families who settled here after partition. The highly qualified teachers of the college try to impart quality education by both conventional and non-conventional methods. Apart from academic excellence, the college also pays sincere attention to the physical, moral and cultural development of the students. The college has a large playground and ample sports equipment which encourage our students to engage themselves in different sports activities on a regular basis. The Women's Hostel of the college is serving the girl students of our college, UG and PG, and also students from neighbouring institutions. This serves to mitigate the serious accommodation problem and career aspirations for female students coming from distant areas.

As part of academic flexibility the college has been running several Addon/Certificate courses for enhancing the skill development of students. The college has also set up an incubation centre for Mushroom cultivation wherein the students are trained for entrepreneurial initiatives.

The college has MoU with several institutions through which faculty and students exchange programs are regularly maintained. With its ample laboratory resources it is serving the students of other colleges in a programmed manner, it is thus serving as a hub amongst cluster of colleges within the district.
